A wonderful meal was recently served by Mr. Ingram at his home, the food having been prepared by his cook, Walter Anderson. A select group of friends was delighted by the unique and flavorful meal. The meal consisted of Hamburger Steak, made with a pound of raw flank steak and a small onion chopped until a perfect mince and mixed together. Seasoned to perfection with salt and pepper. The meat was then made into cakes, but quite flat and squared off (Mr. Ingram says this cooks them more evenly). They are then fried in a pan until brown. The hamburger steaks were sent to the table warm and covered in boiled onions. They were accompanied by crisp fried potatoes. The cold raw potatoes were cut into long strips, as opposed to the traditional cubes. These stripes were then thrown into boiling lard until they were a uniform light brown color. Drained and seasoned with salt they were the perfect complement to the hamburger steaks. The small sweet rolls Mr. Anderson baked were also worthy of praise. A few guests enjoyed the surprising treat of putting the meat and onions on top of the rolls and found it was quite the taste sensation.

The meal was ended with a most delicious and buttery pound cake. It was found to be so good the diners wished they could put the leftovers in a bag and carry them home!

Those lucky enough to be at the table all agreed the food left them craving more! An idea was floated around that Mr. Ingram and Mr. Anderson should consider opening a restaurant together. Said one guest, when asked about the quality of the food, "I do believe if I had the opportunity to purchase food this good in the American House Hotel restaurant my wife and I would buy it by the sack!"

Guam Captured!

On June 20, a U.S. fleet commanded by Captain Henry Glass, consisting of the protected cruiser USS *Charleston* and three transports carrying troops to the Philippines, entered Guam's Apra Harbor, Captain Glass having opened sealed orders instructing him to proceed to Guam and capture it. The *Charleston* fired a few cannon rounds at Fort Santa Cruz without receiving return fire. Two local officials, not knowing that war had been declared and believing the firing had been a salute, came out to the *Charleston* to apologize for their inability to return the salute as they were out of gunpowder. Glass informed them that the U.S. and Spain were at war.

The following day, Glass sent Lt. William Braunersruehter to meet the Spanish Governor to arrange the surrender of the island and the Spanish garrison there. Some 54 Spanish infantry were captured and transported to the Philippines as prisoners of war. No U.S. forces were left on Guam, but the only U.S. citizen on the island, Frank Portusach, told Captain Glass that he would look after things until U.S. forces returned.

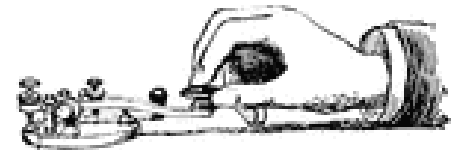
